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Note to Parents and Teachers

In Deuteronomy 6:5–7, it says: "You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your strength. And these words which I command you today shall be in your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, when you walk by the way, when you lie down, and when you rise up."

Scripture makes it clear that the primary responsibility for teaching children lies with parents, however they choose to teach their children. This curriculum will be most effective if you discuss each reading and lesson with your students after they do the work. The thought questions included with the lessons provide an excellent opportunity for discussion between you and your students. In addition, you are encouraged to use the weekly readings for devotionals. Although these questions are not included with the curriculum, here are some questions that can be asked after each lesson:

- 1. What is something that this passage teaches you about God?
- 2. What is something you can pray for as a result of this passage?
- 3. What is one question you have from this passage?

When you discuss each passage with your students, they will be far more likely to think about the passage and how to apply it to their lives.

Introduction

The *Studying God's Word Series* is designed to have the student encounter the biblical text firsthand. Many students grow up hearing Bible stories from their parents, or in Sunday school, homeschool, or Christian day-school curricula. The work that these people and programs do for children is valuable for their growth and maturity. The goal of this curriculum is to go beyond the stories of the Bible and to have students read the Bible itself.

The first book in this series, *God's Plan for His People: Lessons from the Old and New Testaments*, is a Bible lesson book designed specifically for third graders, though students of other age groups will enjoy the lessons, activities, and accompanying illustrations. This workbook focuses on lessons found within the Old and New Testaments. The main doctrines of Creation, the Fall, Judgment, and Redemption, as well as other significant biblical truths, are brought to life within these pages. The following books in this series follow the Scriptures chronologically, Genesis to Acts.

The New King James Version (NKJV) is the translation used for this course. We chose this version because the King James Version of the Bible is the most widely used English translation, and the New King James Version of the Bible is a little easier for students to read. While it is possible to complete this curriculum using other translations of the Bible, the questions in the workbook use the language and phrases of the NKJV. As a result, it may be difficult at times to find the answers to these questions without using the NKJV.

Each week, the workbook includes the following elements:

- **D**ay 1 has a lesson for students to read, followed by questions about the lesson.
- Day 2 has students read the Bible passage for the week, followed by questions over the Bible reading.
- □ Day 3 is designed for students to complete an activity (such as completing a word search or crossword puzzle; unscrambling words; decoding a Bible verse; solving a maze; or doing another activity, depending on the week), and to answer two or three thought questions.
- □ Day 4 includes an exercise (such as reading a Bible passage and answering questions, answering review questions on previous lessons, doing a map study, or completing some other exercise, depending on the week).
- **Day 5** is set aside for students to review the week's material and take a ten-question quiz. Many of these questions are designed to bring out some of the important points in the biblical text.

On average, the student will read about one chapter of the Bible per week. A separate answer key for all workbook questions is available through Christian Liberty Press.

Finally, a separate quiz packet is available through Christian Liberty Press. There is one quiz per week—a total of thirty-six quizzes for the whole course. The quizzes cover material found in the textbook and Bible passages.

Day 1

Lesson 20

If you were with Jesus while He was ministering to the people living in Israel, you would discover that it could be very tiring. Jesus spent long days preaching to and teaching the people and healing the sick. Jesus and His disciples had gone into the wilderness to get some rest, but a great crowd followed them. The people had seen or heard about Jesus and His miracles, so they followed Him everywhere He went.

When Jesus saw the multitude, He was immediately full of compassion for these lost sheep. He healed their sick and taught them about the kingdom of God. After many hours had passed, the disciples decided to send the crowd away to find food to eat.

The disciples served the bread and fish to the 5,000 men, as well as women and children.

However, Jesus continued to have compassion for the needs of these people. He did not want to send them away. Instead, He asked His disciples to give them some food. They told Jesus that all they had was five loaves of bread and two fish that a boy had brought. Then Jesus told His disciples to have the crowd sit down in groups of fifty, and He blessed the little bit of food that the boy had given. Jesus then broke the food and gave it to His disciples to pass out to the 5,000



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men and also to the women and children who came with them. After all the people had eaten, there were twelve baskets of the leftover pieces of bread and fish!

The boy in this story had a small gift, but Jesus used it to bless thousands of people. We, too, can honor and obey God in all that we do and with all that we have. Jesus can use our small gifts in a great way to bless others.

Day 1

Lesson 21

It is easy to trust the Lord when the sun is shining and things are going well. What happens, though, when the storm clouds start to come and problems overwhelm our lives?

After Jesus fed the 5,000, the disciples got into a boat and were crossing the Sea of Galilee. Then, in the middle of the sea, they began to be tossed by the waves because a great wind was blowing. Early in the morning, they saw Jesus walking on the water. Peter said, "Lord, if it is You, command me to come to You on the water" (Matthew 14:28). Then Jesus called to Peter to come out of the boat and walk to Him on the water. Peter trusted Jesus as long as his attention was focused upon the Savior. However, once he looked around and saw the wind and the waves, he became fright-

The disciples saw Jesus walking on the water.

ened and began to sink. Did Peter sink into the water because Christ stopped helping him? No! Peter sank because he stopped trusting the Lord.

Like Peter, we too are sometimes faced with problems. For some boys and girls, their parents get a divorce, a close friend suddenly dies, a bully keeps on annoying them, or maybe they end up becoming very sick. Yet Jesus is always there with us. No matter what goes wrong, the Lord will



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help us get through any difficulty. When we are afraid and begin to have doubts, we need to look to the Lord and ask Him to help us from sinking into a sea of worry and sin (Psalm 56:3).

Like Peter, if we focus our attention upon our problems and not the Lord Jesus, we will lose our hope and courage. Psalm 46:1 says, "God is our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble." As we trust the Lord, He will give us the strength to stand and not give up or become fearful in the midst of our trials.





Day 1

Lesson 22

Upon a high mountain, three of the disciples received their first glimpse of the glory of the Lord Jesus Christ. Many Bible students believe that this mountain was Mount Tabor, which is southwest of the Sea of Galilee. It was difficult for these disciples to understand that Christ was the living God. They knew that He was a very godly teacher and could do wonderful miracles, but they had not fully comprehended that Jesus was the Son of God and an equal member of the Trinity.

Several days earlier, Peter had admitted that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of the living God (Matthew 16:16). Now the Lord gave him the opportunity to see what his statement truly meant. Before the disciples' eyes, Christ was changed: "His face shone like the sun, and His clothes became as white as the light" (Matthew 17:2).

As we study the life and work of the Lord Jesus, we cannot forget that Jesus is both man and God. Philippians 2:6–11 explains that even though Christ was God, He became a man, so that He could suffer and die for our sins. Even as a man, He was still God; but He humbled Himself and eventually died on the cross to pay the penalty for our sins. On the third day, Jesus rose from the dead, proving that He had conquered sin and death.

During Christ's transfiguration, a bright cloud overshadowed Jesus and the disciples. Then God the Father spoke out from the cloud and said, "This is My beloved Son, in whom I am well pleased. Hear Him!" (Matthew 17:5). The disciples were so afraid that they fell on their faces, but Jesus comforted them by saying,



"Do not be afraid" (Matthew 17:7). Because Jesus is God, we are to obey everything He has taught us in the Bible.

Moses and Elijah appeared and talked with Jesus.



Day 1

Lesson 23

We tend to put a lot of emphasis on being the best. We want to get the highest test score. We want to win the championship ball game. We want to earn the most money.

The truth is that all talents, abilities, and blessings come from God. We are to use and enjoy these earthly gifts; but in God's point of view, the most important thing is that we love and trust Him with all our being (Mark 12:30).

The Lord knew that His disciples did not fully understand His Kingdom. They were dreaming of an earthly, temporal one when David's kingdom would be reestablished. They had been with Jesus as crowds gathered and as He performed miracles. So, in their limited understanding, His disciples wondered which of them would be the greatest one in Jesus' Kingdom.

Jesus surprised His disciples. He called a little child and set him in the middle of them. Jesus said, "Therefore whoever humbles himself as this little child is the greatest in the kingdom of heaven" (Matthew 18:4). He did not say the one who became rich, famous, or powerful would become the greatest; but one who would become like a servant and be like a small child would be great. "Whoever receives one little child like this in My name receives Me" (Matthew 18:5).

Fame, riches, and power are not equal to greatness in God's Kingdom. Instead, the one who humbly depends on Jesus as Savior and who becomes a joyful servant—out of love and gratitude—is the greatest in God's Kingdom.


