


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Note to Parents:

In Deuteronomy 6:5–7, it says: "You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your strength. And these words which I command you today shall be in your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, when you walk by the way, when you lie down, and when you rise up."

Scripture makes it clear that the primary responsibility for teaching children lies with the parents, particularly the fathers. This curriculum will be most effective if parents discuss each reading and lesson with the students after they do the work. The thought questions included with the lessons provide an excellent opportunity for discussion between parents and their students. In addition, parents are encouraged to use the weekly readings for family devotionals. Although these questions are not included with the curriculum, here are some questions that can be asked after each lesson:

- 1. What is something that this passage teaches you about God?
- 2. What is something you can pray for as a result of this passage?
- 3. What is one question you have from this passage?

When you discuss each passage with your students, they will be far more likely to think about the passage and how to apply it to their lives.

Introduction

The *Studying God's Word Series* is designed to have the student encounter the biblical text firsthand. Many students grow up hearing Bible stories in Sunday school or from their parents, or even from similar homeschooling curricula. The work that these people and programs do for children is very valuable for their growth and maturity. The goal of this curriculum is to go beyond the stories of the Bible and to have students read the Bible itself.

Preparing God's People, Genesis to Ruth covers the books of the Bible from Genesis to Ruth. Students will learn about leading figures such as Adam and Eve, Noah, Job, Abraham and Sarah, Jacob, Joseph, Moses, Joshua, Deborah, Gideon, and Samson. They also will learn how God called His people to the Promised Land and how the people of God wavered between disobeying God's commands and repenting for their rebellion. Throughout these lessons, God's love for His people is reflected in His discipline, judgment, and restoration to fellowship with Himself.

The New King James Version (NKJV) is the translation used for this course. We chose this version because the King James Version of the Bible is the most widely used English translation, and the New King James Version of the Bible is a little easier for students to read. While it is possible to complete this curriculum using other translations of the Bible, the questions in the workbook use the language and phrases of the NKJV. As a result, it may be difficult at times to find the answers to these questions without using the NKJV.

This workbook is divided into four units, covering nine weeks per unit. Each week includes the following elements:
 Day 1 has a lesson for students to read, followed by questions about the lesson.
 Day 2 has students read the Bible passage for the week, followed by questions over the Bible reading.
 Day 3 is designed for students to complete an activity (such as a word search puzzle, crossword puzzle, scrambled words puzzle, the decoding of a Bible verse, a genealogy completion, a maze, or another activity, depending on the week), and to answer two or three thought questions.
 Day 4 includes an exercise (such as reading a Bible passage and answering questions, covering background material on a book of the Bible, answering review questions on previous lessons, doing a map study, or completing some other exercise), depending on the week.
 Day 5 is set aside for students to review the week's material and take a ten-question quiz. Many of these questions are designed to bring out some of the important points in the biblical text.

On average, the student will read about one chapter of the Bible per week. A separate answer key for all workbook questions is available through Christian Liberty Press.

Finally, a separate quiz packet is available through Christian Liberty Press. There is one quiz per week, a total of thirty-six quizzes for the whole course. The quizzes cover material found in the textbook and Bible passages.

Introduction to Chronological Bible Study

Welcome to one of the most important discoveries you will ever make, the discovery of God's Word. Throughout your life, you will have the opportunity to study the Bible. Each time you do, the Holy Spirit will be there to guide and direct your thoughts to help you learn and grow in the Lord Jesus Christ. It is the hope and prayer of everyone involved in producing this book that through your study you will grow in the wisdom and understanding of God (Ephesians 1:17–19).

In order to make studying the Bible more interesting and beneficial, this book is written to follow the Old Testament in a historical-chronological pattern. We believe it is of utmost importance to the student that as he studies the Bible, he will understand how all the separate stories and books fit together. Imagine a large jigsaw puzzle of a beautiful mountain village. If you were to take a few pieces from different points and study them individually, could you understand what the complete picture is? Of course not. You need to see all the pieces in the correct pattern in order to understand the "big picture." The Bible is the same way. If all we do is read one story here and another one there, we will not understand the true meaning of God's Word. We have to look at the Bible completely and study it as one unit in order to understand God's "big picture."

Throughout this book, besides studying significant stories of the Old Testament, there will also be background information for each of the books as they appear in chronological order. This is available as helpful material so you can further understand the events that happen within the Bible itself.

At the end of this introduction, there is a complete listing of the Old Testament books in chronological order. Please study and memorize this chart so you can later fill in the blanks when a particular section is being reviewed.

On the chart, the top line of blocks contains the eleven main books of the Old Testament. The first five books in this line cover most of the stories and themes presented in this workbook. Although the focus of our study will be in these books (plus Job, Leviticus, and Deuteronomy), the other books are included to give you a true feeling for the flow of history that is recorded in the Bible.


The second row of boxes also represents the historical books of the Old Testament. These are not included in the first row because they do not chart the main flow of history, but rather provide details to what was taking place at that time. For example, 2 Chronicles adds details to the events and stories presented in 1 and 2 Kings.

The third horizontal group of boxes includes Job, Psalms, Proverbs, Ecclesiastes, and the Song of Solomon. This group represents the poetic section of the Old Testament. Job is offset from the rest of the books of poetry because it was written much earlier, during the times of the Patriarchs.

The final block of boxes represents the books of the prophets, which were written during three basic time periods. The first group was written before the Babylonian captivity. The second group was written during the Babylonian captivity. The third group was written after the Babylonian captivity. The boxes for the prophets also indicate to which nation or group of people the book was originally written.





Lesson 20

It had been about one and a half years since the children of Israel had left Egypt, and it was now time for them to enter the Promised Land. This was the land of Canaan that God had promised to Abraham and his descendants. It was a beautiful place that had an abundance of milk and honey. The people must have been very excited. They had just traveled from Mount Sinai to Kadesh Barnea through a hot, dry desert, looking for a place to make their new home. No doubt, many were thinking about planting a farm and raising some animals. Others, perhaps, were hoping to begin new trades and jobs in this land of opportunity.

To prepare the people to move into the land, God had Moses send twelve spies to search and to discover valuable information about Canaan and the people who lived there. When the spies returned, they did not have good news. Joshua and Caleb said that God would help them conquer the land, but ten of the twelve spies said that the Canaanites were too strong and the cities too difficult to defeat. When the children of Israel heard this, they stopped trusting God and became cowards. So God punished them by making

them stay forty years in the wilderness. The spies were in Canaan forty days, so the Israelites were punished for forty years. God also said that all the people who were older than twenty years would eventually die in the wilderness, so only their descendants would enter the Promised Land. The only two people that God said could enter Canaan were Joshua and Caleb. This was because these men trusted God and believed in Him, even when the rest of the people did not.

Do we ever lose our courage by not trusting or believing God? God has a specific plan and purpose for each of our lives. In order to fulfill that purpose, we must have courage in Him. Ephesians chapter 6 commands us to wear the full armor of God so we can fight against sin and temptation, which are the things that make us become cowards. We should look carefully at our lives and ask ourselves if we have courage, so that when God's Word asks us to perform a task, we will be brave enough to do it.



The Big Idea of Numbers: The book of Numbers takes its name from the two censuses found at the beginning and the end of the book. In the first thirteen chapters, God is preparing Israel to enter and take control of the land of Canaan. However, when the twelve spies that were sent into the land return and give a negative report, the people doubt God and His power to protect them. God then judges them by condemning them to stay and wander in the wilderness for a total of forty years, one year for every day that the spies were in the land of Canaan. After the forty years, the people gather at the plains of Moab, and Moses instructs them in the Law. Since the Israelites who came out of Egypt had died, their children may not have received the Law at Mount Sinai as their parents did. Moses wanted to be certain that the people were reminded of God's Law and His faithfulness to them.


One of the most important spiritual lessons that the book of Numbers teaches is that the wilderness wanderings represent a period of time in a believer's life when he stops growing spiritually and stops walking by faith in God. The Israelites had been freed from the bondage of Egypt and were given the Law to help them to grow spiritually. They failed because their faith became weak and they stopped trusting in God. In the same sense, Christians have been freed from the bondage of sin through the death of Christ. Believers sometimes fail because they become stuck in the wilderness of sin by neglecting God and not trusting in Him. By studying the book of Numbers, the Christian can learn how to not wander in sin, but walk in righteousness (Ephesians 4:1-3).



Lesson 21

Look at the chair you are sitting in. Is it strong? Can it hold your weight? Now stand up; then sit back down in your seat. When you sat down, did your chair break or fall apart? Of course not! However, how did you know for certain that the chair would not break when you sat in it? When you sat down, even though you did not think about it, you put faith and trust in the chair to hold you. When you ride in a car, you have faith that the driver will be careful. When you go to the store, you have faith that the construction men built a roof that will not fall on your head. Every day you are putting your faith and trust in things and people that you hope will not fail you.

As Christians, how much more do we need to have faith that God will take care of us! Sometimes, we forget about God's power and love for us, and we may lose faith in Him as the Israelites did. This not only happens when troubles or problems enter our lives, but it also happens when things are going well for us. Sometimes, when we have been blessed by the Lord, we neglect our relationship with Him and focus our attention upon other things. We must

not forget how important God is and how much our lives depend upon Him.

In this lesson, the Israelites are once again complaining about the food and water. During the wilderness wanderings, they grumbled continually. Whenever they stopped trusting God, He had to discipline them in order to help them see how sinful and foolish they were. When Moses made the brass serpent and put it on the pole, it was symbolic of Christ's death on the cross. Just as the Israelites looked at the snake to save their physical lives, we can look to the cross of Christ to save our spiritual lives. Our walk of faith in God begins when we trust Him as Savior, and continues after we die and go to be with Him in heaven.

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





Lesson 22

Have you ever read the book *Charlotte's Web*? It is a story about a talking spider, Charlotte, who helps her good friend, Wilbur the pig. If you have never read this book, ask your parents to consider purchasing it for your library. It is an excellent story about friendship and sacrifice. In reality, we know that spiders, pigs, or any other kind of animal cannot talk intelligently; but one time God miraculously caused a donkey to talk! In this lesson, we will study about this talking donkey and his master Balaam.

Balaam was riding on his donkey, planning to do something that was wrong, so God sent His angel to stop him. The only problem was that Balaam could not see the angel, though the donkey could. Finally, after Balaam had beaten his donkey several times in order to make her go, God opened the mouth of the donkey so she could speak to Balaam.



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Balaam was a wicked man who attempted to curse the children of Israel. Further evidence of this is found in Numbers 25:1–9 and 31:16, when Balaam counseled Moab to entice Israel into Baal worship and sexual immorality. Jude 11 and 2 Peter 2:15 describe Balaam as an unrighteous individual who was interested only in his own financial gain.

As believers, we need to be aware that there will be unrighteous people who will try to tempt and destroy us. In response, we must remain committed to God's Word and understand that God will protect us. Our memory verse reminds us that we do not fight against flesh and blood. We wage a spiritual war. By equipping ourselves with the full armor of God, we will have the protection and strength necessary to fight and defeat the unrighteous.





Lesson Goal: To understand that God righteously

punishes sin and wickedness

Background Text: Numbers 31:1–24

Memory Verse: For the wrath of God is revealed from

Day 1

Lesson 23

To the unbeliever, it may appear that God's judgment of sin and of the pagan nations was too strong, even severe. Numbers 16:49 shows that 14,700 people died as a result of complaining against Moses and Aaron. Numbers 21:35 says that all the people of King Og's domain, including the women and children, were slain by the Israelites. In the passage for this lesson, Numbers 31:17–18 describes how the children of Israel were to kill all the Midianite people except the young girls. Why did God take such extreme measures against sin? God is loving and kind to those who follow Him; but He is also just and hates all form of sin and corruption.

One way that God judged immorality and wickedness was through the children of Israel. History tells us that some of the people in and around Canaan would offer infant sacrifices in the worship of their pagan gods. Some of the nations had a practice called "foundation sacrifices." When a home was being built, a child from the family would be sacrificed and killed, with its lifeless body placed into the foundation of the new home. This was intended to bring "good luck" to the rest of the family. Because of

these practices, which broke God's moral law, they deserved to be punished. God used the Israelites as His instrument to inflict His righteous judgment (Deuteronomy 9:5).

It is no secret that the morals and values of the people in our society today have been declining. Because God is holy and is a good Judge, He will not sit by idly and simply let people continue on in their disobedience. This country, along with the rest of the world, is being punished by God because we have failed to obey Him. People are receiving the consequences of their sin. Only when the churches begin to preach God's moral laws, and the people begin to obey them, will God stop His punishment of this sin. God has given us laws and direction because He loves us and understands that sinful people will destroy themselves without a righteous standard to follow.

In our own lives, we may have never killed someone or robbed a bank, but we have sinned in other ways that are displeasing to God. It is necessary for us to realize that God hates sin. So how does God deal with our sin? He sent His one and only Son to die on the cross for our sins. "For by grace you have been saved through faith, and that not of yourselves; it is the gift of God, not of works, lest anyone should boast. For we are His workmanship, created in Christ Jesus for good works, which God prepared beforehand that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2:8–10). When Matthew 5:16 tells us to be the light of the world, it means we are to be shining examples of God's righteousness. Our prayer should be for pure and holy lives, so that we might be good examples of righteousness and bring glory to God.


