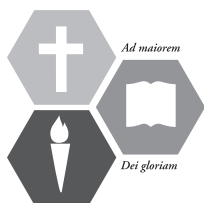

Text Key

A Is for Alligator (page 4)

1. The mother alligator places her eggs under a pile of grass.
2. The alligator's eyes are on the top of its head.
3. The alligator uses its teeth for grabbing.

B Is for Beetle (page 7)

1. There are over 250,000 kinds of beetles.
2. Boll weevils can destroy cotton crops.
3. The bombardier beetle defends itself with a chemical that is very hot (or poisonous).

C Is for Camel (page 10)

1. Name something a camel likes to eat. *Answers may vary. The student is only required to give one type of food.*

A camel likes to eat plants, hay, grains (such as wheat and oats), dates, and grass. When food is hard to find, it may eat dried leaves, seeds, and desert plants.

2. Camels live in the dry desert.
3. A camel has eyelashes over its eyes to keep the sand out.

D Is for Dolphin (page 13)

1. Dolphins belong to the whale family.
2. Dolphins have a thick layer of fat that helps keep them warm.
3. Dolphins communicate using clicks and whistles.

E Is for Elephant (page 17)

1. An elephant may weigh up to 10,000 pounds.
2. An elephant has two large teeth called tusks, weighing 50 pounds each.
3. An elephant uses its trunk to pick up food.
