If you are using this workbook as a formal study of phonics, we recommend that you use the progression found in the table of contents listing. As a phonics course, the material was designed to be completed in this order.

The alphabetical listing has been included to more easily find a specific topic, should you be using this text as a supplement to another phonics program and your student needs specific help in a particular area.

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## Introduction

Students are often directed to demonstrate their comprehension of lesson material by way of written exercises. Ideally, students should be encouraged to complete most of these exercises by themselves. However, some students may become unnecessarily frustrated with the quantity of written work that appears throughout the workbook. Therefore, instructors may allow their students to complete some of the workbook lessons orally; however, students in CLASS must complete all workbook lessons. Instructors are encouraged to be sensitive to the individual capabilities of each of their students, especially in the area of handwriting development.

## Diphthongs on and ow

A diphthong is two vowel sounds in one syllable. The diphthong ou makes the sound that is heard in house. Another diphthong that makes this sound is ow, which is used at the end of words as in cow, or when words with dipthongs end with $\mathbf{l}$ as in $\mathbf{o w l}$ or $\mathbf{n}$ as in crown.

## * Rule Six For Dividing Words

Rule Six: When a single consonant comes between two vowels, the word is usually divided after the consonant if the first vowel sound is short as in cab' in, heave' en, and shad' ow.

Rule 10 a: When a word ends in le, the consonant just before the le is usually part of the last syllable as in bu' gle and cat' the.
