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Introduction

These flashcards and charts were designed for use with Christian Liberty's *Adventures in Phonics: Level A*, and they are specifically referenced in the teacher's manual for that course. You may, however, use them with any introductory-level phonics program or to simply reinforce phonics principles for a student who may be struggling to master certain sounds.

Unless you are using the flashcards for review purposes, each letter or phonetic sound card should be introduced at the time the new sound is being learned. By associating the card with the sound, the student will be reminded of the correct pronunciation each time the card is seen.

The charts provide a quick summary of many of the basic phonics rules and include listings of words that serve as examples of those rules.

Note: The number next to each chart is for reference purposes when using the *Adventures in Phonics: Level A Teacher's Manual.*


Cutting the Flashcards

The flashcards are designed to be 3" x 4" in size. Lines on one side of the cards have been provided to facilitate cutting. If you are using a cutting board, the flashcards should be cut according to the following directions.

- 1. Remove the staple and set the phonics charts aside.
- 2. Hold the flashcards (not charts) in a landscape format.
- 3. Remove 1" from the left and right sides of each sheet.
- 4. Remove $\frac{1}{4}$ " from the top and bottom of each sheet.
- 5. Cut the sheet horizontally down the middle.
- 6. Cut the remaining two strips into thirds, making cuts every 3".


Do not cut the phonics charts. They are designed for standard, letter-sized paper.

Short Vowels

Short Vowel Rule: When there is *one* vowel in a word, either at the beginning or between two consonants, it usually has the <u>short vowel</u> sound.
